

Vernon Griffin was born on Sept. 26, 1954, and passed away on Dec. 6, 2019, at age 65. His final resting place is the Roselawn Cemetery in Bardwell, Ky.

He served in the Air Force from 1974-98 earning the rank of Master Sergeant. MSgt Griffin was part of Operation New Life during the evacuation of Saigon at the end of the Vietnam War. Other duty stations include Washington DC, North Dakota, Arkansas and Michigan and overseas in Europe and Asia. He served as a Security Policeman, Training Manager, first sergeant and superintendent while in the Air Force. MSgt Griffin was a graduate of the NCO and Senior NCO Academies.

His awards include the Meritorious Service (2); Commendation (3); Achievement; Good Conduct (5); National Defense Service (2); and Humanitarian Service medals; Outstanding Unit; NCO Professional Military Education; Longevity (4); Small Arms Expert Marksmanship (2); and Training ribbons.

Flag of Carl Tahah Flown October 1

Carl Kenneth Tahah was born on June 26, 1932, and passed away on Oct. 12, 2012, at age 80. His final resting place is Highland Cemetery in Lawton.

He served on active duty in the Navy from 1950-72 earning the grade of Petty Officer First Class. PO1 Tahah was a Ship Serviceman. He served onboard the USS Jason, USS Maury, USS Interdictor and USS Hancock and shore duty at San Diego Naval Training Center, Cali., Whiting Field Naval Air Station, Fla., Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, Vallejo Naval Shipyards, Cali. and Adak Naval Air Station, Alaska.

His awards include the Meritorious Service Commendation; Good Conduct (6); National Defense Service (2); Korean Service with/Campaign Star, Korean War Service; United Nations Service with/Korea Clasp; Vietnam Service with/1 Silver and 2 Bronze Campaign Stars (7 Campaigns); Vietnam Gallantry Cross with/Palm; Vietnam Campaign with/1960 Device; and Occupation with/Japan Clasp medals; He also received two letters of Commendation and three Citations for Outstanding Performance.

Flag of Edmond "Eddie" Mahseet Flown October 2

Edmond Lee "Eddie" Mahseet was born on July 16, 1947, and passed away on Feb. 26, 2021, at age 73. His final resting place is the Mahseet Family Cemetery in Apache.

He served in the Marine Corps from 1964-68 earning the rank of Corporal. Cpl Mahseet served two tours of duty in Vietnam, as an infantry and commander's radioman with the 1st Marine Division. In all he participated in 26 combat operations. In the book "Young Blood, A History of the 1st Battalion, 27th Marines" he is credited with fighting and killing the enemy in Hand to Hand combat.

His awards include two Combat Action ribbons; the Presidential Unit Citation twice and Vietnam Presidential Unit Citation; National Defense Service, Armed Forces Expeditionary, Vietnam Service with/4 Campaign Stars; Vietnam Gallantry Cross with/Palm; and Vietnam Campaign with/1960 Device; and the Jungle Expert badge.

He is one of only 30 Comanches to earn the honorary title of Numu Pukutsi.

MEMORIAL DINNER AND HYMN SINGING







The Comanche Nation Historic Preservation Office hosted a memorial dinner and Comanche Hymn Singing on Sept. 29, to honor those who passed away from COVID. Numerous singers from all over sang beautiful Comanche hymns throughout the evening.

The Historical Preservation Director Martina Minthorn said, "There was 395 tribal citizens that passed away since March 2020. We wanted to host a memorial dinner to bring those grieving families together. Many of those families didn't get to have a proper funeral or mourners meal. We wanted to host the hymn singing to be able to share those songs and to bring everybody together with a good meal. We had a photo booth to be able to take family photos and they were printed on site. Many people take phones these days with their cell phone but never really print their pictures. The photos will be saved for the tribal archives and the incentive for taking photos was a historic preservation T-shirt and a couple of bags of John Copes Indian Corn. We recorded the hymn singing and will be distributing those soon. We had a PowerPoint of all the names of the deceased by their month of death. Many of the families brought photos of their loved ones to the memorial dinner."

New Pathways participated in the Comanche Nation Fair Parade on October 1st. They always have a lot of fun promoting the Spirit Walk.





Richard Ralph Poafpybitty was a proud Comanche Man, from the Yapuruhka band (an Esa Rosa Descendant). He was also Omaha (from the Elk and Buffalo Clans) and Arapaho (a Chief Little Raven and Sand Creek Survivor Descendant).

Born to Bill Poafpybitty and Laura Tyndall Poafpybitty, raised in Apache OK at Chandler Creek. He was taught by his father how to make traditional weapons (bows, war clubs and shields) and how to make his own regalia. Combining the aspects of his bloodline to create his Signature Style and Way of Dance.

The Wolf head represented what old-time Comanche Scouts, would wear to sneak up on the enemy on raids, and hunting parties. After he learned his Helushka ways he danced with a bustle. His look inspired and continues to inspire many across the United States and Canada. Not only is he remembered fondly for his dance style but for who he was as a person. He was a friend to many and a dedicated father.

Poafpybitty left behind loving children, Ferran, the late Cor-
