Housing **Authority Awarded** \$2 Million Grant for Home Repairs

CNHA to rehabilitate up to 27 homes with 2022 federal funding

Comanche Nation Housing Authority (CNHA), a Comanche Nation-affiliated organization that promotes self-sufficiency and provides affordable, safe and decent housing to low-income tribal members, received a \$2 million federal grant on behalf of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), marking its ninth consecutive year as a grant recipient. The funding will further CNHA's home rehabilitation efforts to increase access to affordable housing for tribal members.

"Ongoing housing rehabilitation is a necessity to provide safe and viable living spaces to tribal members," said Nora Sovo, deputy director of CNHA. "The grant's impact goes further than rehabilitating homes. It offers residents a chance to stay in the homes and communities that their families have helped build for generations."


CNHA received the grant as part of the Indian Community Development Block Grant (ICDBG) program, which services 55 tribal communities with this award cycle. As the ICDBG grant explicitly allows a focus on home repairs, CNHA plans to complete interior and exterior repairs in up to 27 homes over a threeyear period.

Interior rehabilitations will focus on electrical panel upgrades, plumbing repairs and bathroom repairs, as well as installation of interior doors, cabinets, counter tops, plumbing fixtures, water heaters, flooring, insulation, duct work and HVAC units. Exterior rehabilitations will include the replacement and repair of roofs, exterior doors, siding, generator installation, garage doors and pin pad openers, foundation repairs and energy efficient windows.

"Once the grant is completed, we will have invested a total of \$2.7 million into our Nation's residents," said Sovo. "Our goal is to make critical and meaningful changes throughout our community that our tribal members can take pride in calling home."

The program is now accepting applications from Comanche Nation members who are living within CNHA's service areas and are income eligible. CNHA will service homes in need of rehabilitation services based upon living conditions and other eligibility requirements which include maximum home expenditure limits. All services must be completed within the grant's three-year term life.

CNHA currently serves five counties in Southwest Oklahoma, including Caddo, Comanche, Cotton, Kiowa and Tillman, for their federal grant programs. To learn more about the ICDBG Home Rehabilitation Program or to apply, call (580) 357-4956 or visit www.comanchehousing.com.

One of the featured artists at the June 13-14 Sovereignty Symposium in Oklahoma City was Dr. Eric Tippeconnic, Comanche Nation member and tenured track Professor of American Indian Studies at California State University San Marcos. Dr. Tippeconnic was honored with the Sovereignty Award. He painted the original acrylic canvas piece "The Ambassadors," depicting two Comanche women on horseback. The image was utilized as promotional art for the symposium poster, shirts, and other merchandise. In addition, Tippeconnic's painting "Briefcase Warrior" was utilized as promotional art for the 2018 Sovereignty Symposium. "The Ambassadors" and "Briefcase Warrior" hang outside the Oklahoma State Supreme Court chambers in the Oklahoma Justice Center. In addition to his artwork, Tippeconnic has served as a panelist and moderator at the Symposium since 2017. The Sovereignty Award is premised on consistent contributions to the Sovereignty Symposium. Some of the past winners are Harvey Pratt and Susan Shown Harjo. Tippeconnic is the great-grandson of Tupi-Kuni, grandson of John Tippeconnic, and son of Norman Tippeconnic Sr.

"As Chairman of the Comanche, I have faith in our Comanche Nation and TOGETHER we are making a positive impact for our People. We are definitely "Comanche Strong!" said Mark Woommavovah, Chairman of the Comanche Nation.

Tippeconnic has a webhttps://www.erictippeconnic. site. com, stating, "Comanche artist Eric Tippeconnic is an enrolled member of the Comanche Nation on his father's side, and his mother hails from Copenhagen, Denmark. Tippeconnic's interest in painting and art was heavily influenced while growing up on numerous reservations and indigenous communities, as well as from traveling to Denmark each summer to visit his mother's side. Tippeconnic's cultural diversity and love of history and art from an early age helped develop his interest and passion for creating art from the moment he could hold a pencil. Using bright, rich, and vibrant color combinations, Tippeconnic utilizes his artwork to capture movement that serves as a metaphor for the viewer, which boldly states that Indigenous American cultures, while intimately connected to their history, are, in fact, contemporary, alive, and constantly evolving. Tippeconnic completed his Ph.D. in History at the University of New Mexico. He is the first Comanche to receive a Ph.D. in the field of History. Tippeconnic resides in southern California with his family and teaches at California State University San Marcos in the American Indian Studies department."





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
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A Total of Seven Resolutions are Presented at the June CBC Meeting

Chairman Woommavovah called the meeting to order at 10 a.m. Secretary/Treasurer conducted the roll call. All CBC were present, and a quorum was established. Wahnee conducted the invocation.

CBC No. 3, Alice Kassanavoid, motions to approve the minutes of the May 2023 meeting. CBC No. 4, Robert Komahcheet seconds the motion. The motion carries 6/0/0.

Kassanavoid motions to table Resolution No. 57-2023 until the July meeting. CBC No. 2, Ross Kahrahrah seconds it. The motion carries

Chairman Woommavovah reported he attended all required meetings. He and the Realty Director met with the BIA Director to discuss the fee-to-trust application process. He attended numerous graduation ceremonies for Comanche graduates at different high schools and colleges. He was the guest at the University of Oklahoma ROTC Commissioning Ceremony. He and the First Lady honored the CIVA Auxiliary Organization with a brunch to honor their commitment to service and dedication to the Comanche veterans. He was a part of the Comanche Little Ponies' annual powwow. He attended the honoring of Sallie Kerchee for 45 years of working at the Goodyear company. He attended the Comanche Elder Center's Wisdom Warriors Walking Club Banquet. He, along with the First Lady, the Comanche Nation Princess, the Comanche Nation Jr. Princess, and the CIVA Princess, represented the Comanche Nation at the Armed Forces Day Parade. He attended the CIVA Armed Forces Day Banquet. He, with five other tribal members, represented the Comanche Nation at the Tour de Meers Bicycle Race. He greeted the students and parents on the first day of summer school at the Comanche Academy.

Vice Chairman Dr. Cornel Pewewardy reported he attended the summer camp at Riverside Indian School. He attended all the meet and greets of the candidates running for office. He attended all required meetings. He met with the CEO of the Native American Hall of Fame in Oklahoma City for program planning. He spoke with students at the Sovereign Community School in Oklahoma City. He spoke at the MMIP at the Oklahoma State Capital. He attended the KCA Veterans Powwow and the Comanche Little Ponies Powwow. He thanked Oklahoma Legislatures Troy Caldwell and John Montgomery for overriding SB 429 regarding tribal regalia at graduations. He congratulated the parents of graduates and urged all tribal members to vote.

Secretary/Treasurer Wahnee reported he worked with the tribe's accounting firm to ensure all accounting was thorough and distributed a report to the CBC. He monitored the ARP Office and operations to ensure payments were getting processed. He attended the CIVA Armed Forces Day Banquet. He reviewed the Realty Department land holdings and reported a book now showing all the land owned by the Comanche Nation. It will be uploaded to the Comanche Nation website once updated. He is working on the fee properties under trust and waiting on the BIA to respond. He met with the Tax Administrator to ensure the CBC directions were provided for and complied with for the last six months. He monitored the entities' financial accounts to ensure they were complying. He worked with the IT Dept. and the Tribal Administrator

(TA) about upgrading the Nation's

Indian Health Board- CBC #3 – They met on May 8 and were given updates on the Strongheart Study, and the acting CEO gave updates on the services units in Carnegie, Anadarko, and Lawton. Renovations are ongoing for the pharmacy. The next project is the Emergency Room. Any hospital complaints can be turned in to the Patient Advocate.

Cow-Calf Program- CBC #4 - They did not meet last month. Komahcheet announced they are applying for a grant to have a meat processing plant.

Tax Commission- Secretary/ Treasurer – Wahnee gave the report during the Executive Committee's re-

KCAILUC-Chairman ported they are reviewing all leases and maintaining all of the KCA cemeteries. The committee is still looking for a director. The job description can be found on their website. He added the KCA will auction off the items at the waterpark and all funds will go to the KCA fund. A discussion followed about the KCA property and the water

CNHA- CBC #3 - Kassanavoid reported all CBC members were present for the meeting except for Ross Brandt (Kahrahrah) who missed the last two meetings consecutively. They are awaiting BIA funds for a new program to assist out of area tribal members. The Housing's Elders Program is on a waiting list. All emergencies are going through the HIP Program.

Enterprise- CBC #3 & CBC #4 - Kassanavoid reported per the charter, the Enterprise is only required to give an annual report and that was given at their annual meeting held Feb. 25. They are looking to hire a CEO. The closing date is June 9; more information can be found on the Comanche Nation website.



State Bill 429 Effects Hundreds of Native Graduates in Oklahoma State Legislature Overturns Veto ; Law Goes Into Effect July 1

On May 1, Oklahoma Governor Kevin Stitt vetoed Senate Bill (SB) 429. The veto comes about a week before some students' graduation.

Comanche Nation Vice Chairman, Cornel Pewewardy, said he helped write SB 429, which started about five years ago after he returned to Lawton, Okla. He shared the idea with Representative Trey Caldwell, stating that other states have passed laws protecting native students at grad-

Pewewardy said he showed Caldwell various templates from states such as Oregon, Washington and Califor-

"As my understanding, there is nothing like this, and we need this desperately because I've been meeting with a lot of native students, and they were caught in the conundrum that they could not wear any tribal regalia at their graduations," Pewewardy said. "We went to work to craft such a bill."

The veto impacted one parent, Danielle Werito, from Elgin Public Schools. She said it was okay for her daughter, Anabah Werito, to wear a feather but not a beaded cap to graduation. Anabah talked to the senior sponsor, who said she couldn't walk across a stage if she wore a beaded cap.

Danielle said her daughter questioned why she couldn't wear a beaded cap, which is part of her heritage, but the school could host a baccalaureate with a religious

Werito said her daughter chose not to wear the beaded cap to graduation.

"It is a tough decision, and we do not want to take away from any of the othin her class," she said.

Pewewardy said students could make a standpoint.

"This is quite the issue...just talking about one of the Comanche citizens [Anabah] who attends Elgin Public Schools, she was denied that right, and that's why we became advocates to ensure that superintendent knows that we're in opposition to his decision," he said. "And we base it on not only our resolution but...a religious right, a constitutional right and also self-determination public schools."

Werito said she'd attend more meetings, including school board meetings, to push for change.

"Because this problem just needs to stop," she said. "No kid should have to feel like this, especially a day or a day or two before their graduation. This is a celebration and an accomplishment for all. Not just Native Americans or minorities in general, every race."

She said Native citizens must find a way to fix the

"We're going to have to get with Congress, and we're going to have to fix these laws," she said. "...Even like the bill Governor Stitt just vetoed, and it passed 90 to 1, and he is a citizen of a tribe that is here in Oklahoma...he should know how passionate we are about ourselves."

Pewewardy said the bill took multiple times to

pass, starting three years ago.

"It was unsuccessful: I don't think it got out of the house," he said. "So, we er kids that are still graduating tried it again... [in 2022] the same way, and it got stopped at the house. But this year it passed not only the house and senate...but it got vetoed...by Governor Stitt."

He said the Comanche Nation advocates cultural enrichment and knows that students from Pre-K through doctoral programs will be confronted with institutional policy

Pewewardy said it's been an uphill battle since Native Americans have been granted the right to vote.

"And to express ourselves in our own way, in our tradition and our language, has been our challenge," he said. "Because it's also been an uphill battle fighting against... Angelo conformity.; meaning that you speak English only and we don't. I see English as a foreign language, actually. Our language is Numunu, the people's language."

Comanche Nation Chairman, Mark Woommavovah, said the Comanche Nation responded to the veto of SB 429. He said the Comanche Nation passed a motion at a Comanche Business Committee meeting to send a letter

"What the governor did is he failed to uphold his duty to more than 156,000 native students in the public school system in Oklahoma," he said.

Woommavovah said it's an expression of students' legal rights.

"We're going to back

our students; we feel this is very important," he said.

He said the letter's significance is to voice the Nation's opinion against the bill's he said. Governor Stitt.

"We stand behind our culture. It's our pride for our students to express this, and it's also their expression of religion," he said. "So, we 100 percent back our students, and we do it through unity, and we do it through our nation."

Woommavovah said he hopes the Nation's voice reaches out to the leadership of the state of Oklahoma.

"Our tribal leaders are rallying to overturn this," he said. "We know the importance of expressing our culture and our cultural heritage. So, we're going to unify, and we're going to take everything we have, and we're going to fight to override this, and hopefully, the Senate and House override this veto."

Pewewardy said he was asked to remove his feather from his graduation cap due to policy regulations.

"I took the feather off and tucked it into my cap and gown; however, when I went to the stage, I was the next one up to get the diploma, and I pulled it out and put it back on

Woommavovah said the issue united the nation to help current and future stu-

Pewewardy said it's about a 45-year-long history. He graduated from Northeastern State University in Tahlequah and said his parents gave him an eagle feather.

"And I put it on top of my cap, and I stood in line

with hundreds of other students...and I guess my feather caught the attention of officers at the graduation ceremony,"

Governor Stitt's veto was overruled on office but has not received a May 25 by the Oklahoma leg-

Thank you to the members of the Oklahoma Legislature who voted to override Governor Stitt on bills important to the Cherokee Nation and tribal citizens across the state," Principal Chief of the Cherokee Nation of Oklahoma Chuck Hoskin, Jr. said in a statement to Native News Online. "Nearly every legislator

voted to overturn the vetoes." The law goes into ef-







Eggplant Rollatini

Ingredients

• 2 Medium eggplants, sliced into 1/4 thick planks

- 1 Tbsp. of salt
- 3/4 Cups of flour
- 1 Tsp. black pepper
- 1 ½ Tsp Italian seasoning
- Extra virgin olive oil for fry-

For the Filling

- 1 ½ Cup of ricotta
- 1 Cup of shredded mozza-
- 1/4 Cup of freshly grated Parmesan
- 1 Large egg
- 2 Cloves of garlic, grated
- 1/4 Cup chopped fresh basil • ½ Tsp. salt
- ½ Tsp. black pepper
- ½ Tsp. crushed red pepper

For Assembly

- 1 Cup of shredded mozza-
- 1 ½ Cup of tomato/marinara sauce
- 3/4 Cups of freshly grated par-Directions mesan
- 1. Lay eggplant slices on a large baking sheet lined with a cooling rack. Lightly season eggplant planks with salt on both sides and let sit for 30 minutes to release excess moisture. Pat dry with paper towels.
- 2. In a large bowl, combine

flour, pepper, and Italian seasoning. In a large high-sided pan, heat three tablespoons of oil over medium heat until shimmering. Working in batches, coat eggplant evenly in flour mixture, shaking off excess, and add to the pan. Fry eggplant until golden, about 2 minutes per side; transfer to a plate. Repeat with the remaining eggplant, adding more oil to the pan as needed.

3. In a medium bowl, mix together all filling ingredients until smooth. Place one heaping tablespoon of filling onto the bottom of each eggplant slice and roll it up into a log.

4. Preheat oven to 375°. In a 9"-x-13" baking dish, spread ½ cup tomato sauce in an even layer. Arrange rolled eggplant in a single layer over sauce. Top with remaining 1 cup mozzarella, 1 cup tomato sauce, and 3/4 cup Parmesan. Then bake until the sauce is bubbly and the cheese is melted, about 30 minutes.

Southwestern Pasta Salad

Ingredients

- 2 Ears of corn, shucked
- 1 16 oz. Box of medium shell
- 3/4 Cup of sour cream
- 3/4 Cup of mayonnaise
- 1 1 oz. Packet of ranch seasoning mix
- 2-3 Chipotle peppers in adobo, seeded
- 1 Tsp. of lime zest
- 1 Tbsp. of lime juice
- ½ Tsp. ground cumin
- 1 Package of cherry tomatoes, halved
- 1 15 oz. Can of pinto beans, drained and rinsed
- 2 Avocados, diced
- 1 Orange bell pepper, seeded and chopped
- ½ Medium red onion, chopped
- 1 Cup of chopped fresh ci-
- 1 Cup of shredded Mexican cheese blend

Directions

- 1. Bring a large pot of salt water to a boil. Boil the corn until tender, 4 to 5 minutes. Remove the corn from the pot with a fine mesh strainer and rinse with cold water to cool.
- **2.** Add the pasta to the same pot of boiling water and cook one minute longer than the package directions. Drain, rinse with cold water, and let cool.
- 3. In a blender, combine the sour cream, mayonnaise, ranch seasoning mix, two chipotle peppers, lime zest, lime juice, and cumin. Blend until smooth. Taste and blend in a third chipotle pepper, if desired.
- 4. Cut the corn off the cobs. In a large bowl, combine the corn, cooled pasta, cherry tomatoes, pinto beans, avocado, bell pepper, red onion, cilantro, and cheese. Fold to combine. Gently fold in the dressing. Serve chilled.



Strawberry Icebox Cake Ingredients


- 1. 8 oz. Cream cheese at room temperature
- 2. 1 Cup of powdered sugar
- 3. 3 Cups of heavy cream
- 4. 1 Tbsp. vanilla bean paste or extract
- 5. 1 Tbsp. lemon zest 6. 20 Graham cracker sheets
- 7. 1 ½ lb. Strawberries, sliced about 1/4 inch thick
- 8. ½ Cups of sliced almonds

Directions

- 1. Beat the cream cheese in the bowl of a stand mixer with the beater attachment until smooth. Add the powdered sugar; beat until smooth.
- 2. Scrape down the sides of the bowl. Add 1 cup of the heavy cream and beat at low speed until smooth. Add the remaining 2 cups of cream; beat at medium to medium-high speed until soft peaks form, increasing the speed as the mixture begins to thicken. Fold in

- the vanilla and lemon zest.
- 3. Spoon 1/4 cup of the cream mixture into the bottom of a 9-by-9-inch pan or baking dish; spread into a thin, even layer.
- 4. Top with the graham crackers in a single, even layer, breaking them as needed to fit. Spread about 1 1/2 cups of the cream mixture over the graham crackers, smoothing into an even layer using a spoon or offset spatula. Top the cream mixture with an even layer of berries (about 1 1/2 cups). Sprinkle evenly with 1/4 cup of the almonds if using.
- 5. Repeat one more time, then top with a final layer of graham crackers, cream mixture, and berries.
- 6. Cover with plastic wrap and refrigerate at least four hours or up to overnight.





Fort Sill National Historic Landmark and Museum opens its Native American Collections

The Intertribal Display Took Visitors on a 157-year journey of history

added a History chapter on May 30 and May 31, when the Fort Sill National Historic Landmark and Museum opened its Native American Collections to 150 members of various tribes to display artifacts from various tribes such as the Comanche, Kiowa, Apache, and Sioux that took the visitors on a 157-Tahbonemah. year journey. It was an emotional and spiritual excursion for many people who had the

opportunity to experience. The purpose of the event was an outreach of Fort Sill to have acts of healing and strengthening bonds with the local tribes. The staff said they are very honored to be a part of the event and hope that this helps in some way to build better bridges of communication and understanding between Fort Sill and the surrounding Tribes.

Some noted artifacts included items that belonged to Quanah Parker and his son, Baldwin, that had direct ties to the Native American Church. Other noted items included a hat belonging to Geronimo, a peace pipe that belonged to Sitting Bull, and a war bonnet of I-See-O, also known as

Members of the Native American Church cedared the items off the evening of May 30, followed by a series of Native American Church songs and a meal provided by the Comanche Nation Prevention and Recovery Program.

"After seeing all of my great grandfather's things, now I know what it is to carry the Parker name. It was hard for me not to cry," said Jr. Comanche Nation Princess Vivien Parker. "My family always told me it is a big thing

"Because we could not invite many people, we invited the princesses. Not only do they represent themselves and their families, but they also represent their tribes and organizations," explained Tina Emhoolah, coordinator.

The princesses who the Kiowa tribe paying hom- attended included the Comanche Nation Princess, the Comanche Nation Jr. Princess, the Ft. Sill Apache Princess. the Comanche Homecoming Princess, the KCA Veterans Princess, the CIVA Princess, and the Walters Service Club Princess.

The princesses also toured surrounding museums and the Sherman House. The history of the Sherman House is that while visiting Fort Sill, General William Tecumseh Sherman narrowly escaped death at the hands of Kiowa warriors during a council held on the front porch here. May 27, 1871.

Watching the princesses walk to the Sherman House moved Emhoolah.

"The pictures of the girls and the spirit in them were

something to behold. There is power speaking through them and what we witnessed watching them bravely and determined together for the Sherman House. They all together learn who and what that house. The pictures convey to me that through education and the spirit of their ancestors, this Band of Sisters rose up, conquered the pains of the past, and claimed our future. It was like the legend of those women who rode horses and went into battle came alive in them," expressed Emhoolah.

The event concluded with a meal provided by the Comanche Nation Prevention and Recovery Program. Visitors continued to view the artifacts throughout the afternoon.





Douglas Wins First in Special Olympics





The class was instructed by the Oklahoma County Sheriff's Office and Oklahoma Council on Law Enforcement and Training (C.L.E.T.) Troy Fullbright D.T. Master Instructor. The D.T. School lasted for two weeks in January, followed by another two weeks in February for a total

of four weeks of training time.

Officer Holder, has practiced and taught Martial Arts for over 26 years in the style of Tae Kwon Do Do Kwan and currently holds the rank of fifth-degree black belt under Instructor Brent Roberts in Apache, Okla.

Officer Holder said, "When Comanche Nation Police Department approached me about becoming a D.T. Instructor, I knew this was my calling, and this was my chance to really be an asset to my department and for the Comanche Nation Tribal community and our local Law Enforcement agency."

Instructor Fullbright and now Oklahoma C.L.E.E.T. both use the Gracie Retention and Control for immediate enforcement. Royce Gracie is a retired Brazilian Professional mixed Martial Arts, UFC Fighter, and Gracie Jiu-jitsu Practitioner, and he attended one of the classes as an instructor.

The goal of these classes is to teach how to get a combative individual under control by using retention and control tactics; in doing so, it reduces possible injuries to the subject and the officers. Officer Holder added, "After attending the D.T. course, I learned so much about ground fighting, and I now have the opportunity to help my fellow offi-

StrongHearts Raising Up Elder Abuse Awareness

Despite the horror of being physically hurt and having their money or medication stolen, elders who are abused or neglected often endure the abuse without calling for help. As lifelong caregivers and protectors, many elders suffer in silence to maintain the well-being of their family, and that may include their abuser.

June 15, is World Elder Abuse Awareness Day. A day to raise awareness and prevent elder abuse. It's a day to reflect on what it's like to become an Elder and the many challenges they face, such as: losing strength, muscle, and bone mass. Mental clarity can deteriorate and lead to memory loss. These inevitable vulnerabilities leave our elders at risk of being abused.

According to the National Council on Aging, most abuse occurs in the home and at the hands of family members.

"It's unacceptable when elders silently suffer abuse and neglect at the hands of those who should be protecting them," said CEO Lori Jump, StrongHearts Native Helpline. "Many elders refuse to report their abusers because they are closely related and want to protect their family, but there are so many more reasons that most people can't imagine."

- Love: Despite the abuse or neglect, victims continue to love their abusive partner or relative.
- Fear: Elders may fear retaliation if they report the abuse.
- Embarrassment: Worrying about what others might think or do to make matters worse.
- Lack of Resources: Many elders live on fixed incomes and may depend on their abuser for shelter.

• Accessibility: Elders may be unable to report if they do not have ac-

cess to cell phones, internet, and/or transportation.

• Polyvictimization and Normalization: For generations, Native people have endured multiple types of abuse at the hands of non-Natives - so much so that abuse seems normal - an everyday part of life.

Elder abuse is an intentional act or failure to act that causes or creates a risk of harm to an older adult. The abuser can be a family member, caretaker, or another person that the elder trusts. Types of abuse can include:

- Emotional abuse causes mental pain, fear, and/or distress
- Physical abuse the use of force to cause pain, injury, etc
- Financial abuse improper use of an elder's money, property, or assets
- Caregiver neglect a failure to meet basic needs (food, water, medical care)
- Sexual abuse forced or unwanted sexual interactions of any kind
- Cultural and spiritual abuse Learn the Signs of Abuse

The signs of elder abuse may be difficult to spot as they could sometimes be the result of disease, side effects from medications, or similar reasons.

However, if you suspect that an Elder is being abused, be patient, talk, and listen to them. Be aware that they may say that they are being "disrespected" rather than abused. Other signs of abuse may include:

- Unexplained bruising or injury
- Changes in behavior
- Lack of interest in family or social events
- Loss of weight
- Not having necessary medical aids (glasses, walkers, teeth, etc) or adequate food, water, shelter

Education is always the first step. Understand the warning signs of elder abuse and pay attention to the elders in your

life. Ensuring that our elders are properly cared for can include:

- Offering to help those in your family that might be feeling burdened with the care of a loved one.
- Spending time with an elder and planning a rotating schedule if you have multiple caregivers.
- Bringing them nutritional foods like baked goods or, even better, fry bread.
- Talking and listening to their stories because elders have a lot of wisdom to share and appreciate.
- Every state has an Adult Protective Services division for those wishing to report abuse at www.napsa-now.org/ help-in-your-area.

Serving all individuals who reach out for their services regardless of race, ethnicity, gender, gender identity, age, religion, national origin, sexual orientation, disability, or any other factor protected by local, state, or federal law, StrongHearts avocates are available 24/7 to provide support and advocacy, make referrals to Native centered service providers and connect our relatives to regionally available resources. 
special maternal grandparents Kate Heah Komah and Mikey Tadanippah.

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




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
