Realty Department Meets with BIA About Fee-to-Trust Process

Comanche Nation Chairman, Mark Woommavovah, and Comanche Nation Realty Director, Stephen Lee, recently met with R. Gabriel Morgan, the Deputy Regional Director of the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA), to discuss the fee-to-trust application process. The meeting took place at the Comanche Nation Complex and was aimed at speeding up the process.

The fee-to-trust application process is critical for tribes seeking to acquire land and establish sovereignty. However, the process can be lengthy and complicated, often taking years to complete. This can be a significant barrier for tribes seeking to expand their land base and economic opportunities.

During the meeting, Chairman Woommavovah and Director Lee discussed the challenges faced by the Comanche Nation in the fee-to-trust application process. They also shared their ideas for streamlining the process and making it more efficient.

Deputy Regional Director, Morgan listened to their concerns and ideas and provided feedback on how the BIA could help expedite the process. He also shared information about recent changes to the fee-totrust application process and how they could benefit the Comanche Nation.

The meeting was productive, and all parties agreed to continue working together to find ways to speed up the fee-to-trust application process. Chairman Woommavovah expressed his appreciation for Deputy Regional Director Morgan's willingness to listen and work collaboratively with the Comanche Nation.

The Comanche Nation is committed to expanding its land base and economic opportunities, and the fee-to-trust application process is a critical step in achieving these goals. By working with the BIA, the Comanche Nation is confident that it can overcome the challenges and succeed in the fee-to-trust application process.

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Comanche Nation Housing Authority Testifies at House of Representatives Committee

Hearing

Executive Director
Russell Sossamon
provides direct dialogue
to Congress on Native
American housing issues

On May 15, Comanche Nation Housing Authority's (CNHA) Executive Director, Russell Sossamon, testified before Congress to address the housing issues that face Native Americans in Southwest Oklahoma. Sossamon provided direct dialogue to Congressman Tom Cole, drawing attention to the Indian Community Development Block Grant (ICDBG)'s scoring and funding regulations.

The hearing presented six invited tribal representatives with the opportunity to give testimonies centered on tribal concerns. Sossamon was invited as a non-governmental witness during the committee hearing, which focused on transportation and housing domains. It was the first hearing of its kind by this congressional committee to hear tribal perspectives for these areas.

The hearing, which serves as a component of the budget process for the House of Representatives, allowed for the Comanche Nation Housing Authority to engage in direct and substantive discussions with the members of Congress responsible for funding Native American programs.

"Testifying to a congressional committee is an honor afforded to few Americans. Sossamon's representation of CNHA at the national level solidified our position," said Nora Sovo, Deputy Director of CNHA. "Sossaman's nearly 30 years of knowledge and experience in our industry make him one of our most trusted representatives."

Sossaman dedicated his attention to the formulation of the Indian Housing Block Grant (IHBG) and the IHBG Competitive and their current level of funding and scoring processes. The IHBG Competitive is a highly sought-after program that provides adequate housing and suitable living environments for tribal members.

The funding that supports the program is limited, restricting its ability to service all of those in need. The program's scoring works in favor of construction instead of acquisition. Constructing new properties takes much longer than acquiring existing properties, which delays the ability to provide more homes to tribal members.

Sossamon testified in favor of increasing the funds that are allocated to the IHBG programs and amending the scoring processes for the IHBG Competitive to allow equal preference for acquisitions. More funding and acquiring properties would allow CNHA and other housing authorities to increase its efforts and improve living conditions for more tribal members in a timely matter.

A Total of 12 Resolutions are Presented at the May CBC Meeting

The Comanche Nation Chairman, Mark Woommavovah, calls the meeting to order at 10 a.m. John Wahnee conducted a roll call. Comanche Business Committee (CBC) No. 2, Ross Kahrahrah, was absent at the roll call, and a quorum was established. Wahnee provided the invocation.

CBC No. 3, Alice Kassanavoid, motions to approve the May agenda. CBC No. 4, Robert Komahcheet seconds it. The motion carries 5/0/0.

Wahnee takes the floor to talk about the high school graduates being restricted from wearing beaded graduation hats and other Native items during the graduation ceremony due to Oklahoma Governor Stitt vetoing the Oklahoma Senate House Bill SB429. Comanche Nation Vice Chairman, Dr. Cornel Pewewardy, reads a resolution to be signed by the CBC and given to Governor Stitt.

Kassanavoid makes a motion to approve the minutes of Meeting April 2023 CBC Meeting. Pewewardy seconds it. The motion carries

Executive/General Council

Officer Reports

Chairman Woommavovah said he honored the passing of Comanche veteran and Comanche Indian Veterans Association member George Red Elk. He was a speaker for the Oklahoma Municipal League List for Public Safety, Criminal Justice Reform, and Tribal Symposiums. He was the keynote speaker at the Lawton Public Schools American Indian Graduation Ceremony. He gave the welcoming address for the Voc Rehab Symposium, attended the Comanche Academy Graduation Ceremony, and he was the Keynote Speaker of the Cameron University Commencement Ceremony.

Vice Chairman Pewewardy said he attended all required meetings. He and the Indigenous Peoples Day Committee hosted a gourd dance powwow in Carnegie, Okla. He spoke at the Sovereign Community School. He sat on a panel for the American Indian Law Review. He spoke at both the University of Kansas Symposium in Lawrence, Kan., and the University of New Mexico in Las Crucis, N.M. He received the Spirit Award from the Cameron University administration. He attended the MMIP at the Oklahoma State Capital.

Secretary/Treasurer Wahnee announced he would propose establishing a Special Committee to plan economic development for the tribe five and ten years ahead. He presented the Capital Expenditures Reports about the Comanche Nation Casinos. He said renovations are needed for the upkeep of the casinos. He added that another report will follow at next month's meeting.

He reported the Tax Commission has a total of \$3,321,464. The oil and gas has a balance of \$333,105.

Committee/Board Reports from CBC

Indian Health Board- CBC

#3 Kassanavoid reported that renovations at the Lawton Hospital are ongoing, and a new mammogram machine is being installed. Any complaints can be given to the Patient Advocate at the Indian Hospital.

Cow-Calf Program- CBC #4 Komahcheet reported that the bulls were tested for breeding soundness, the program purchased a drone and added another bull to the herd. Twin calves were born. The program hired an ag manager for cattle management. They created a Facebook Page called Comanche Nation Land and Cattle. The are looking into alternate breed-

ing methods due to the drought. They have a total of 139 head of cattle.

KCAILUC-Chairman Woommavovah reported that the committee reviews all land leases and maintains the KCA cemeteries. They are looking for a KCA director and currently have an interim direc-

CNHA- CBC #3Kassanaovid reported that the Elder Program had made 1,300 contacts in April. They are still waiting on the BIA to begin the new program for out-ofarea tribal members. It will be a onetime assistance.

Enterprise- CBC #3 & CBC #4 Kassanavoid reported that their annual meeting was held in February. Resolutions



The Power Of Positivity

We all know that one person who immediately makes us feel heavy after a conversation with them. They will find everything that is wrong or could go wrong in a situation and can't bear to see the good in anything. They focus on everything that isn't going right rather than being thankful for the things that are. You probably have someone who immediately jumps into your mind, or you might even be thinking, "yes, this is me."

Comanche Nation Entertainment Hosts Bloods Drives In May Team Members Received Paid Time Off For Donations

In May, Comanche Nation Entertainment hosted public blood drives at its Comanche Red River Hotel Casino in Devol and Comanche Nation Casino in Lawton to give back to the community.

Comanche Nation Entertainment, through its charitable Comanche Cares initiative, offered team members who donated blood additional incentives, including theme park tickets and paid time off.

Team members who donated received eight or more hours of paid time off. Each successful donor also received a free t-shirt from the Oklahoma Blood Institute and a ticket of their choice to the Science Museum Oklahoma, Six Flags Frontier City or Six Flags Hurricane Harbor OKC.

Comanche Red River Hotel and Casino's blood drive was held on May 24 between 2 p.m. and 6 p.m. and Comanche Nation Casino's was held on May 30 from 9:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Prior to donating, all participants received a health screening, blood pressure and cholesterol check.

"Our team members are passionate about uplifting the community. Through our giving initiative Comanche Cares, we have been able to provide \$1.5 million in resources for Oklahoma families," said Mia Tahdooahnippah, CEO of Comanche Nation Entertainment. "Since blood donations are something money can't buy, we wanted to find ways that our team members could contribute to the great need for blood donors."

Comanche Cares hosts blood drives at its properties throughout the year. The drives support the high demand for blood donations. According to the Oklahoma Blood Institute, someone needs blood in the state every two seconds, and one blood donation can save up to three lives. Blood transfusions are often needed for those involved in car crashes, surgeries and other treatments for cancer patients or another illness.

During my term, the Nation has opened the Anadarko Outreach office, War Pony Casino, Cache Casino (phase 1) & gas station, and will soon be opening the Day Care facility in Lawton. We also started the Cow & Calf operation through the Realty department. Just recently, we have expedited the Higher Education program's scholarship program to send out award letters electronically, next we are trying to see if we can send scholarship awards to schools electronically. For Housing, we are working to serve all tribal members, not just the local 5-7 county jurisdictions.

Through my work with CN Enterprises, we have a new board of directors that have seen to it that audits are complete. Most recently, we started Numunu Construction, which was awarded the new Records Retention building that is being constructed at the complex now.

Prior to the current administration, I have attended tribal consultations with several governmental agencies, so the Comanche Nation has representation and a seat at the table.

With the assistance of the ARP, we were able to assist tribal members in Home Repairs, direct payments, rental and food assistance, and most recently, home closing costs. The CBC authorized that 87% of ARP funding went to tribal members.


On May 15, Comanche Nation Housing Authority's (CNHA) Executive Director Russell Sossamon testified before Congress to address the housing issues that face Native Americans in Southwest Oklahoma.

"Since the grant favors construction, CNHA often must operate on Fee Simple Land as Trust Land is often in rural areas far from amenities, jobs and resources," said Sovo. "This is more costly and time consuming. If the grant showed equal preference to acquisitions, tribal members could select an existing home in the area of their choosing, increasing our ability to place tribal members in safe housing."

During his address, Sossamon also highlighted the cultural norms of Native American families that demonstrate the grant's impact. "It is customary for Native families to reside with their extended families, including parents or grandparents. This practice reduces the burden on nursing care, and consequently, on the need for federal subsidies. It is crucial to view this grant as an investment, which will yield significant returns in the long run."

135 adults along with 20 children attended the event.



Chicken Tomato Pesto Burrata Pasta

Ingredients

- 8 oz. Whole wheat linguine
- 1 Tbsp olive oil
- 2 Tsp minced garlic
- 1 1/2 Cups grape or cherry tomatoes
- 1 Tsp salt
- 1 Tsp pepper
- 3/4 cup pesto
- 2 Cups cooked chicken (shredded or cubed)

- Working quickly before the mixture sets up, drop tablespoons of the mixture onto the prepared pans, flattening slightly if you like. Let stand at room temp until firm.




Goombi



"I went out and ran every day to prepare for this."

"I've always been an avid runner because I have a little brother who is severely disabled, can't walk, can talk and take advantage of the gift God's given me when others don't

Ahtone ran 3.1 miles for the second leg of the race. He said he enjoyed the marathon.

"It felt really good this morning to get up and participate with the team members," he said. "You know we all came together...our own little tribe, as you would say, and it was fun

[to] get out there and compete and... represent Comanche Nation as good as we can."

Parker ran a little over 7 miles as the third leg; he lives in Arizona and visited Oklahoma to run the marathon.

"I'm in the service, so anytime I get to run back home is a beautiful feeling for me," he said. "And to run it with the tribe in Oklahoma City, my fourth time running here, felt beautiful, so it's a great day."

Parker said he wasn't personally affected by the Oklahoma City Bombing; however, he knew people who responded to the bomb-

"I'm a former Comanche Nation CHR, and at the time of the bombing, I wasn't working as a CHR, but I do remember there were CHRs...and other members of the tribe who responded as first responders to the Oklahoma City Memorial bombing," he said. "And so, because of that, and I was around those people as an employee, I held them in high regard...so in that way, it's affected my respect for the men and women

who were first responders on that horrible day and that tragic day."

Woommavovah ran the final 6.2 miles of the marathon.

"I feel great because we're able to share this with our Comanche runners right here. Not only that, but we showed our Comanche pride," he said. "We will always run with our colors, and we let our community know we're here and we're doing big things in Southwest Oklahoma at the Comanche Nation."

Cleveland said crossing the finish line was a great feeling.

"...Proud of my people; it was amazing crossing the finish line together, and I encourage you all to get out, especially on pretty days like this," she said. "I know I'm guilty myself not going out every day, and I think we need to make it a priority to take care of ourselves and also represent our people at events like this."

June News Release In Honor and Memory of US Army Sergeant George 'Gerald' Red Elk Sunrise January 29, 1948 - Sunset **April 19, 2023 Interment at Deyo Indian Mission** Cemetery, Lawton Okla. On April 25, 2023



George "Gerald" Red Elk George "Gerald" Red Elk,

served in the U.S. Army in 1967-1973, and in the Oklahoma Army National Guard from 1982-1991, earning the rank of Staff Sergeant.

He served during the Vietnam War w/11TH Armored Cavalry Regiment (as a Tank Commander) & Persian Gulf War (as a Field Artillery Surveyor) w/45th Infantry Division, awarded Silver Star, the third highest award for Gallantry.

His citation reads in part: "Red Elk, George, Sergeant, United States Army, Company D, 1st Squadron, 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment distinguished himself by gallantry in action while engaged in military operations involving conflict with an armed hostile force on March 18, 1969, while serving as a Tank Commander in the Republic of Vietnam. On this date, Company D was conducting a sweep through the Michelin Rubber Plantation when fierce contact was made with an estimated battalion-size force of North Vietnamese Regulars in wellconcealed, bunker fortifications. In the ensuing battle, Sergeant Red Elk's tank began receiving rocketpropelled grenade fire from the left flank. Reacting instantly, Sergeant Red Elk aggressively maneuvered his vehicle toward the enemy position, engaging them with his main gun. His highly accurate fire completely routed the enemy force, killing two. As he moved back on line, an enemy rocket-propelled grenade round exploded overhead, severely wounding his right hand. Ignoring the pain, Sergeant Red Elk was successful in knocking out a second rocket-propelled grenade team. He courageously remained with his tank for 45 minutes after being wounded, until he passed out from the pain and loss of blood. His heroic example greatly inspired the entire unit to press on and completely overpower the hostile force. Sergeant Red Elk's outstanding personal courage and unwavering devotion to duty were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit and the United States Army." Signed by B.E. Huffman Jr., Brigadier General, GS, Chief of Staff on July 13, 1969.

Sergeant Red Elk was also awarded the Army Commendation (2) & Army Reserve Achievement Medals and is the son of Comanche Code Talker Roderick Red Elk – also stationed Fort Knox, Ky., Fort Riley, Kan., Lawton, Okla., Fort Carson, Colo., Dugway Proving Grounds, Utah, Saudi Arabia and Iraq, other awards include Purple Heart, Vietnam Service medal w/4 Bronze Service Stars, Vietnam Gallantry Cross w/Palm, Vietnam Campaign medal w/1960 Device, Southwest Asia Service medal w/2 Bronze Service Stars, Saudi Arabian Liberation of Kuwait medal, Kuwait Liberation of Kuwait medal, Good Conduct medal w/2 Bronze Loops, National Defense Service medal w/Bronze Star, Army Service Ribbon, NCO Professional Development Ribbon 2/Numeral 2, Overseas Ribbon, Expert and Marksman Qualification Badges w/Rifle and Pistol Bars, selected as 2/64th Armor NCO of the Quarter, selected as "Top Gun" for 5/32nd Armor Tank Gunnery Qualification Test and graduate of the NCO Candidate School, inducted into the Oklahoma Military Hall of Fame on November 11, 2011. He was honored by the Military Times- Hall of Valor and the Oklahoma Historical Society for his actions during the Vietnam War. George Red Elk earned the honorary title of Numu Putuski. for Heroism-Gallantry-Valor.

During his time in service, he was awarded the Silver Star, Purple Heart medals and was inducted into the Oklahoma Military Hall of Fame. During Color Guard Details, George was designated to carry the Comanche Code Talker Flag in Honor of his father.

The deadline to file a claim in the bankruptcy is July 7, 2023, at 5:00 p.m. (prevailing Eastern Time). The deadline to object to Endo's sale is July 7, 2023, at 4:00 p.m. (prevailing Eastern Time).

WHAT IS THIS ABOUT?

On August 16, 2022, Endo International plc and certain of its affiliates filed for chapter 11 bankruptcy in the United States Bankruptcy Court for the Southern District of New York. Certain Endo affiliates manufactured and/or sold, among other things, branded opioid medications (including but not limited to OPANA® (oxymorphone hydrochloride), OPANA® ER (oxymorphone hydrochloride extended release), and PERCOCET® (oxycodone and acetaminophen tablets)), generic opioid medications, generic ranitidine medications, and transvaginal mesh. This notice is intended to inform you of your rights in this bankruptcy regarding the bar date and proof of claim process and Endo's proposed sale of substantially all of its assets.

WHAT IS A CLAIM?

A "claim" means a right to seek payment or other compensation. If you, a child in your care, or another loved one were harmed by Endo or a related company, including Par or American Medical Systems (AMS), or their products, including opioids, ranitidine, or transvaginal mesh, you may have a claim against one or more of these entities. To make a claim, you will need to submit a proof of claim in the bankruptcy case. 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
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
